Summer 2021 Plan Key Elements

- Protect the safety of students and staff and adhere to IDPH Guidance and then the Executive Order
- 2. Provide the opportunity for students (Parent choice) to be vaccinated first before lesser mask use
- 3. Low metrics based on school and community incidence
- 4. Phased or situational approach that was based on health and safety metrics and educational situations/space
- 5. No allowance for teasing and social acceptance of student choice
 - December Board Meeting I discussed advocacy in relation to EO and IDPH

Governor's Executive Order and Legal Cases

- Governor's Executive Order
- Pending Court Case Stay and Findings status
- Governor's Press Conference 2-9-2022
- Ongoing and updated IDPH and ISBE guidance
- Adhering to the guidance and legal implications with district liability, ISBE recognition and athletics eligibility.
- As a Board of Education we have always wanted local control with health and safety metrics with thresholds, guidance

What Metrics are important?

- 1. School Incidence or count per week, expressed as a percentage
- 2. Community Incidence (<u>Northwestern Covid Dashboard</u>) expressed as a percentage
- 3. Vaccination Rate
 - a. County rates are high, we don't track as a district
- 4. Hospitalization capacity
 - a. I have not included, as #2 above and County-wide should capture larger outbreaks
- 5. Responsive to Evaluate Specific Metric and Threshold Guidance to Come

Mitigation Stage - Masking

Optional Masking, Recommended but not Required

• District weekly average over 10 day average (Under 1%)

• Community Rate 10 day average is in Green/Low

• Spaces where 3-6 ft. can be assured

• Busing remains as mandatory, Federal Law

To mask remains a choice

Application to School Year if No EO and Guidance Supports

- 1. The first 2 weeks of school in August would have been Universal Masking for all
- 2. This would have continued and released for 7th and 8th by October since they had vaccination availability. Then situational or Recommended not Required (RR) masking until Winter Break
- K-5 after vaccination availability was met by Thanksgiving. December would have been Situational or RR Masking
- 4. January would have been Universal Masking for K-8 till February 4th. Then K-8 Situational/ Recommended but not Required
- 5. Universal? One week after Thanksgiving, Winter and Spring Break regardless

Social Emotional Learning

- We are still under the EO and someday it will change
- No harassment between students on masking status
- No harassment of our teachers or students by parents on masking status
- Social stories and SEL lessons to protect diversity and student choice

Considerations

- 1. Pre-K, need to evaluate
- 2. Universal, 1 week after longer breaks?
- 3. We can't enforce a parent's expectation one way or another in regards to student choice with masking (lunch and vegetables)
- 4. Metrics and thresholds may change based on guidance and our ongoing evaluation

Timelines with Respect to the EO

- The EO for schools stands.
- Parents may advocate as citizens to the Governor's office and their State
 Legislators to change this rather than demanding a school not adhere to an EO.
- We have always supported local BOE control.
- There are some significant problems to a school district violating an EO
- Regardless, we had to observe and see safer conditions, then build our plan and review before we started. The plan is proposed and has not started.
- The BOE and I will continue to learn and evaluate all options in regards to guidance and the EO.
- If the EO or legal cases give that authority to the local school board we will be (and pretty much are) ready

Communication and Teaching Out to Teachers

- We are building out guidelines for implementation based on the learning schedule and educational design
- 2. Developing an internal FAQ and staff development
- 3. Distancing mitigations typically have educational design solutions

Communication to Parents

- 1. We are still under the EO
- 2. All parents and teachers deserve advance notice of when this could be implemented. Not the weekend before school.
- 3. Parents FAQ for the nuances of the plan when it can move forward
